ABOUT THE PROJECT

This report contains the feedback that residents shared with facilitators at the January community engagements. These include the pop-up at the Wood Buffalo Regional Library Family Literacy Day and the Downtown Neighbourhood Engagement Series held at the Golden Years Society.

The Neighbourhood Engagement Series features ongoing municipal engagements held in alternating urban neighborhoods on a regular basis. These sessions focus on building meaningful relationships by encouraging open and honest input and feedback from residents.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

During the community engagements in January 2024, the Public Engagement team of the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (RMWB) aimed to foster relationships and integrate community perspectives by actively seeking resident input on neighborhood issues and municipal services.

The Neighbourhood Engagement Series made a stop Downtown to hear what matters most to residents. Additionally, we collaborated with the Family Literacy Day event hosted by the Wood Buffalo Regional Library.

Residents from across Fort McMurray are invited to attend community engagements. At the January Downtown Neighbourhood Engagement Series participants identified that they were from Beacon Hill, Downtown and Timberlea.





OVERVIEW

POP-UP AT FAMILY LITERACY DAY



In-person engagement: We popped-up at the Wood Buffalo Regional Library at their Family Literacy Day event. We were able to connect with residents on what is impacting them in their neighbourhoods and gain feedback for the Abasand skatepark rebuild.

At the event we spoke with 208 residents, and heard their concerns and priorities regarding safety, parks, playgrounds, and winter maintenance.

NEIGHBOURHOOD ENGAGEMENT



In-person engagement: Participants were welcomed into the event space at the Golden Years Society and encouraged to share feedback on the multiple Municipal campaigns. Participants had a Participate Bingo card dabbed as they met with RMWB staff and shared their feedback on different topics. This was a drop-in event featuring onsite subject matter experts and a community lunch. There was no formal presentation.

We were joined by 67 residents from across Fort McMurray Wood Buffalo. These participants included a diverse range of individuals, such as new arrivals to the country and region, Keyano students, local downtown businesses, and older adults. Topics discussed included the Abasand Skate Park, Downtown Revitalization Incentives Program, the older adult engagement strategy, and what matters most to them in their neighbourhood.

- Very happy with my neighbourhood. I feel safe.


Next, a couple of general comments about improving our community

- “Lack of part-time jobs for Keyano College students / Student jobs.” (2 votes)




Older adult engagement strategy feedback

How can we enhance your engagement experience?



Parks & Trails

- “Really love Lions Park trail.”
- “Love Kiyam Park.”
- “Benches – Reflections Park; they should be facing the park & forest, not the road.”
- “Beautification for Beacon Hill – entrance; can we get a canoe – multiple flowers instead of 1 flower at entrance – better upkeep of the flowers.”
- “Can Beacon Hill get a public art bench like downtown, Saprae Creek & Anzac.”
- “We should get a fragrance garden downtown by the Snye. Wheelchair accessible.”
- “More family events and upgrade EYCS (Elsie Yannik Catholic School) and Dave McNealy (Public School) Park.”
- “Fencing along roads by playgrounds.”
- “More baby swings at parks.”
- “Toddler friendly play structures at parks.”
- “A wading pool for toddlers.”
- “More toddler friendly parks.”
- “School playground.”
- “Update of windmill park.”



- “Picnic tables – playground areas.”
- “Parks – accessible swings.” (2 votes)
- “More shaded areas.”
- “Neighbourhood Parks & Green Spaces (1 vote) – Love the Snye Park, Add water park by playground by Snye Park, No maintenance on beautiful flower beds etc. – weeding, etc. after planting.”
- “Wood Buffalo revamp waterpark and build adult playground for fitness.”

Accessible parking:


- “Can we get more senior’s parking in the region.”
- “Accessible Spaces next to nature; The Snye, Kiyam is nice but not natural.”
- “Parking garages – Where are we going to park at Kiyam Park?”
- “Can we get accessible parking on Ross Haven.”
- “What matters to me is accessible parking stalls.”

Traffic:

- “Need speed bumps/controls on Father Mercredi Street.”
- “Crosswalks by Fish Place.”
- “Can the traffic lights be removed from Main St. and Clearwater drive? Do not feel this is a high traffic area. Additionally, why do we have an advanced green arrow to turn right at this signal?”

Maintenance and safety:

- “Need parking lots fixed on Hardin/ Lots of cars.”
- “Sidewalks being free of ice & snow.”
- “Cross walk & intersection winter maintenance.”
- “Roads are very slippery near Golden Years Society & Athabasca House.”
- “Sidewalk Clearwater Drive. (Reidel to King Apartment side)” (5 votes)




- “Bus routes should be prioritized for winter maintenance.”
- “Snow clearing on black paths in Parsons Creek.”
- “We seniors need ways better snow & ice removal on sidewalks.” (2 votes)
- “Snow Clearing.” (3 votes)

TRANSIT

New transit route updates came into effect on December 1, 2023. Find your route using the Transit App or Google Maps. For full route maps and schedules, visit rmwb.ca/transit. Have a question about transit? Check out [the frequently asked questions](#).

- “Bus service/routes/connections.” (4 votes)
- “Transit should be free for college students.”
- “Smart bus cost – appreciate the service, even \$2 adds up / Accessible transportation & scheduling that works.” (2 votes)
- “Poor design on bus stop locations. Mid-block is dangerous.”
- “Transit Stops.”
- “Bus to Hindu temple (Abraham’s Landing) – one 1 bus downtown to temple – can a stop be added on the route from Thickwood to Timberlea (Route 12) – Benefit all denominations represented there – Hindu, Muslim, Christian.”
- “Bus Shelters – heating system maintenance, clean them up.”
- “Safety at bus shelters (specifically Hardin & Fraser).”
- “Shuttles to Gregoire Lake & Vista Ridge.”



BYLAW & ENFORCEMENT

The [Municipal Government Act](#) allows the RMWB to create and enforce bylaws that address the safety, issues, and concerns of residents. All bylaws are passed by Council. If you wish to report a bylaw violation, call Pulse at 780-743-7000.

- “Drug use/properties downtown.”
- “No OHV (off-highway vehicles) in neighbourhood and trails>”
- “Safety for me and my family.”
- “Making sure we’re safe.”
- “Bylaw: Enforce parking laws by bus stops in Prairie Creek; Prospect & Rainbow Creek.”



- “More patrol in Parsons Creek. Lots of people run stop signs/crosswalks. Dangerous to walk with kids.”
- “Dog Park – OK, but there are often too aggressive dogs!”
- “Living downtown allows for more independence, but safety & bussing are big concerns.”
- “Neighbourhood security / Crime free / safety.” (3 votes)
- “I see lots of infractions; I call but it takes ages to get results. There is a dog (a shepherd mix) running loose very often at Main & Fraser. We’ve called many times, but nothing happens.”
- “Being informed of incidents in communities (i.e. Crime notices) – want to hear, what can residents do to increase safety, neighbourhood watch, block parent program.”

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

Many of the community programming suggestions below are not services provided by the Municipality.

- “Lots of opportunities to socialize / Wednesday lunch at Golden Years Society / Activities for seniors/socialization / having a place to connect during cold winter days.” (6 additional votes for this comment)
- “RMWB to provide more funding to organizations for activities & programming.”
- “Walking at MacDonald Island (with \$1 coffee).” (3 votes)
- “Block parties – to get to know neighbours / Neighbourhood Potluck.” (2 votes)
- “Community event calendar w/ all the events.”
- “More weekend activities for toddlers; aka Hub or toddler time style.”
- “Activities – Community events.”
- “Weekly farmers markets in the summer.”
- “More family events and upgrade EYCS (Elsie Yannik Catholic School) and Dave McNealy (Public School) Park.” (2 votes)
- “Activities have stopped due to lack of funding – Eagle Ridge YMCA, SSWC.”
- “Chair yoga & meditation.”
- “Increase affordable recreational drop-in options.”



GARBAGE AND RECYCLING SERVICES

- “Recycling.”
- “Water – Less Chlorine.”
- “There should be MASSIVE recycling programs here. I cannot find anywhere to recycle glass containers. All recycling should be optimized. They recently closed down the recycling over by FRESHCO!!!”
- “Water & Sewage Services – good.”
- “Garbage Collection – good, we need much more recycling.”
- “Landfill – Offer more free bin days, recycling options for furniture & items that can be re-used.”

FACILITIES

- “Steps – Depth perception, wooden, markers? on edge of all public steps.”
- “Automatic door openers @ police station – Timberlea @ wheelchair height.”
- “Golden Years Society – Council should sell/give the land to the society so they can qualify for DRIP grants – should modify qualifications for program (i.e. non-profit property on municipal land).”

- “Public Art – enjoy foxes, murals, etc. – more murals on buildings.”
- “Functional art benches, hard to sit on.”
